### How is this portal accessed?

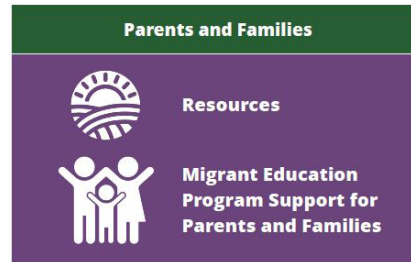

## EDUCATION RESOURCES FOR PARENTS OF K-12 MIGRATORY CHILDREN

### What are the *Education Resources for Parents of K-12 Migratory Children*?

The *Education Resources for Parents of K-12 Migratory Children* portal provides parents with tools needed to work with your child at home. This portal contains resources that are being developed in phases over the next few years. Most resources are available in both English and Spanish.

### What grade levels are currently supported?

Resources are currently available to support migratory children in kindergarten up to twelfth grade, as well as out-of-school youth.

### What are the program components?

For grades K-8:

- Parent-friendly mini-lessons aligned with the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) standards
- Tip sheets for parents that explain and demonstrate specific skills with video examples
- Multi-level interactive games for children, designed to reinforce skills practiced in the mini-lessons

For grades 9-12:

- Interactive online modules that review critical content assessed on the End-of-Course Exams for English I and English II
- Students work independently at their own pace
- Parents provide access and encouragement

For out-of-school youth:

- Information and links to free resources that assist with continuing education, workforce training, health, including mental health, and other support services
